LITTLE AMAL VISITS BRIGHTON



At the end of March a special visitor came to Brighton beach. Her name is Little Amal, a giant puppet who represents a nine-year-old Syrian refugee. She started her journey on the Syrian border in 2012, and since then has travelled right across Europe, with the aim of raising awareness about people who have been forced to leave their homes and families. The name *Amal* means "hope" in Arabic.

When Amal came to Brighton she met some refugees in the afternoon, and then in the early evening she walked along the beach from the West Pier to the Palace Pier. About 1,000 people came out to meet her, including many students and teachers from MEP. Everyone was happy to see her. It was a very special experience, to look into her eyes and walk beside her. The connection between the puppet and the people watching was amazing and moving.

Some of our MEP students (and their children) wrote about what happened when they met Amal.

Here is what **Maryum**, the 11-year-old daughter of MEP student Huda, wrote: *We went to the beach to see Amal, the giant puppet. She came from Syria like us, but she walked. She lived in a camp with her mum. One day, during the war, her mum went out to the shops and never came*

back. Amal wants to find her mum. Her face is happy and sad. She is really tall and she wears enormous boots. Her hair is long and brown. She came to remind people not to forget refugees, and to look after them.

Monica, our student from El Salvador, wrote: *I think it is very important that we all become aware of how people who emigrate from our countries live, and seek to have a home in another country. The process of adapting to a different language, customs, way of life, etc. is very difficult and Amal is the voice of all of us.*

And Monica's son **René**, age 9, wrote: *It's very nice that Amal represents all the migrant children!*

EXETER STREET HALL

We meet each week at Exeter Street Hall, a welcoming airy space which is perfect for our MEP sessions. But how much do you know about the Hall?

The Hall was originally built in 1884, as a church hall, at a cost of £1,799 (that's over £180,000 today). It has always been a busy place, used by people of all ages for many activities. The church decided to sell the hall, and in 2013 over 900 people contributed money in order to buy it and save it for use by the local community.

MEP meets in the Hall every Monday, but when we are not there it is used for many other activities, including toddler groups, table tennis, a monthly repair café, yoga, pilates and ballet classes, and many more. It is also the scene for many social activities including guizzes, music events and food festivals.

In May 2023 volunteers at the Hall hosted a wonderful afternoon for Brighton's migrant community and people from the asylum seekers hotels. Over 150 guests came to enjoy a truly delicious meal and a performance by Syrian



musicians. It was great to see so many people from different cultures mixing and enjoying themselves, along with lots of lively children, dancing, playing and joining in the body painting.

In 2023 Exeter Street Hall will celebrate 10 years of Community ownership. To mark the occasion, there will be several events in September.





The MEP Sewing Group will be helping out

by making some decorations for the Hall – a new banner, and some bunting. We need your help! We are hoping that lots of people from MEP, teachers and students, and not just the Sewing Group, will join in with making some bunting. From mid-May onwards there will be a special table set up in the hall on Mondays, with a sewing machine and fabrics, and a Sewing Group teacher ready to get everyone involved. Let's all work together to help the hall celebrate its 10th anniversary.



MEP invites students and volunteers to come to a Music and **Nature** event in beautiful Stanmer Park, on the edge of Brighton on Monday 24th July.

Join us for an Interactive Listening Walk, as we learn to tune in to the sounds around us and

MEP CELEBRATES THE NHS

On Sunday 2nd April and Sunday 14th May some MEP students and volunteers met at Exeter Street Hall to lend their enthusiasm and creativity to a local National Health Service (NHS) support project - **Threads of Survival** - which celebrates the NHS by making a quilt.

The Threads of Survival project is organising individuals and community groups to make squares which will then be sewn together into a quilt. The quilt will be part of an exhibition to celebrate the 75th birthday of the NHS at the beginning of July.

Our NHS and NHS workers have never needed our support more. The aim of this project is to raise awareness by producing a quilt with a range of messages in support of the NHS and showing concern about what is being done to it - for example, privatisation of many of the NHS services.

MEP students and volunteers made some very colourful squares with messages of support for the NHS. They also celebrated the huge contribution that migrants make to the NHS: approximately 12% of NHS staff are non-British nationals.





SEWING GROUP NEWS
