He will be sadly missed by our volunteers and students.





WELCOME FOR EVERYONE



In 2024 our MEP student Sherin set up a new organisation called **Welcome for Everyone**, with some support and advice from the Resource Centre. The group supports women and children from the whole international community: they already have members from Algeria, Syria, Sudan, Egypt, Yemen, Iraq and Morocco. There were some existing support groups for people from one particular country, but this organisation is open to women from any country. Members pay a small fee (£5 per month). They use the money to arrange events and parties for all types of celebration, such as Eid, or birthday parties and baby showers. They also organise sports events and outings – recently they have had a trip to London, to visit Madame Tussauds, as well as ice skating, swimming and cinema trips. Members pay half the cost, and the organisation covers the rest. Another important activity is Arabic lessons for children, especially to help them learn to read and write in Arabic.
